Nurture innovative Indigenous enterprises to transform nature's resources into sustainable livelihoods and thriving economies.

Bioeconomy & Indigenous Innovation



Fundación Pachamama supports Indigenous communities in cultivating a regenerative bioeconomy rooted in ancestral wisdom and modern innovation. These initiatives uplift local families, protect forest ecosystems, and offer a model for sustainable growth worldwide.

Our Approach: Protect natural resources. Support local communities. Foster sustainable livelihoods. Create a blueprint for global sustainability.

Our Impact: We supported 54 bioenterprises across four Amazonian regions; developed 41 product prototypes, with 29 now being sold or distributed to consumers and buyers.

Global Recognition

The initiative gained international attention at COP16 (Colombia) and Salon du Chocolat (Paris), while our partnership with Ikiam University launched the region's first Bioeconomy Diploma program, nurturing Indigenous entrepreneurs.

Climate Finance & Biodiversity

Fundación Pachamama and Indigenous communities are redefining climate finance by developing models that go beyond carbon credits—ensuring conservation efforts protect ecosystems, preserve cultural heritage, and uphold Indigenous governance.

Advancing Global and Local Advocacy

- **Policy Impact:** Evaluated Ecuador's Environmental Code reforms to strengthen environmental protections.
- Global Advocacy: Partnered with GFLAC (Climate Finance Group for Latin America and the Caribbean) to advance climate finance transparency and represented the Amazon at COP16.
- Capacity Building: Trained Indigenous leaders on climate finance and biodiversity through Peoples Forests Partnership (PFP) workshops.
- Innovative Funding: Advanced the Amazon Bioregional Financial Facility to align funding with Indigenous-led conservation efforts.
- Certification: Achieved Ecuador Zero Carbon Certification and contributed to REDD+ (Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation) 2025 efforts.
- **Research & Strategy:** Published findings on biodiversity finance and developed a strategic roadmap for long-term impact.

Biocultural Crediting: Rethinking Conservation

Our Biocultural Crediting Pilot offers an innovative alternative to traditional carbon offsets—valuing Indigenous communities' role in biodiversity and providing financial incentives for their conservation efforts.

The model goes beyond CO₂ reduction, recognizing the vital link between forests, culture, and Indigenous sovereignty—and benefiting both nature and communities.

2024 Impact:

- 10,000 hectares safeguarded by the Achuar.
- Transparent credit tracking via blockchain, ensuring accountability
- \$43,500 raised from credit sales so far, directly supporting Indigenous-led conservation.
- Potential to expand across 30 million hectares in the Sacred Headwaters.





Ecotourism & Human Footprint



Indigenous-owned ecotourism projects in the Amazon encourage forest protection, cultural preservation, and support local economies, with revenue funding education, healthcare, and environmental stewardship.

Fundación Pachamama and Pachamama Alliance both directly support several local tourism projects in Ecuador's Amazon region. The most prominent are:

Kapawi Ecolodge (in Achuar territory)

Innovation in Sustainability

- **Solar Canoe:** Reduced carbon emissions and operational costs; recognized with the National Energy Globe Award.
- Clean Water Access: Piloted Israeli NUF technology (natural ultrafiltration) to provide safe drinking water in remote areas.
- Global Recognition: Named one of the top five outstanding environmental destinations by the United Nations.

Naku Center (in Sapara territory)

- **Cultural Preservation:** Trained 20 students in Sapara practices, preserving ancestral knowledge.
- **Community Resilience:** Built a tourism infrastructure managed by Indigenous communities.
- Sustainable Livelihoods: Created eco-friendly income streams to replace extractive industries such as mining, oil, and logging, which deplete forest ecosystems.

Human Rights & Rights of Nature

Justice for People and Planet

We're redefining climate and justice by ensuring legal recognition for the rights of people and nature, challenging the traditional notion of human dominance over Nature. Through strategic advocacy, we are transforming the way ecosystems and communities are valued, ensuring they are recognized as rights-bearing entities.

- **Legal Wins:** Secured landmark victories for the rights of nature globally, resulting in enforceable protections for threatened bioregions and the communities that depend on them.
- Extractive Industries: Brought cases to the International Labor Organization that ruled Ecuador violated Indigenous consultation rights in proposed large-scale mining projects affecting the Shuar Arutam People.
- **Leadership Initiatives:** Awarded 33 scholarships in environmental law to Indigenous leaders, trained over 160 climate justice advocates, and launched the Defense Stories series to spotlight their conservation efforts.
- Advocacy & Policy: Supported the Indigenous coalition CONAIE
 (Confederation of Indigenous Nationalities of Ecuador), and their
 proposal for a law that guarantees that Indigenous communities are
 consulted and give prior consent for any development in their territories.
- Global Alliances: Promoted the Escazú Agreement, safeguarding environmental defenders and embedding rights of nature into international frameworks.





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Guardians of the Rainforest

Indigenous communities are the frontline protectors of the Amazon rainforest, preserving biodiversity and ancestral ways of life. Through innovative governance and reforestation, they're investing in the future of the planet.

Impact Highlights

- Land Protection: Continued to safeguard approximately 9.8 million acres through partnerships with CONFENIAE (Confederation of the Indigenous Nationalities of the Ecuadorian Amazon) and COICA (Coordinating Body of Indigenous Organizations of the Amazon Basin) strengthening Indigenous land rights.
- Conservation Agreements: Preserved almost 99,000 acres of rainforest with Achuar communities (set to double to nearly 200,000 acres in 2025).
- **Tech-Enabled Monitoring:** Trained 16 community members in GIS and drone technology to detect threats in real time.
- **Sustainable Futures:** Helped 10+ Indigenous communities develop resource management strategies rooted in traditional knowledge.
- Policy Impact: Collaborated with local governments to integrate Indigenous-led conservation into territorial policies.

Planting the Future

In 2024, our Reforesting Edible Forests initiative merged Indigenous agroforestry wisdom with ecological restoration to revitalize degraded lands and enhance food security.

- Planted 173,026 trees, (105 native Amazonian species, 20% endangered).
- Achieved a 91% survival rate for newly planted trees.
- Reforested 2,632 acres across Pastaza and Morona Santiago provinces.
- Directly benefited 262 individuals (132 women, 130 men) across 47 communities.
- Distributed 243 toolkits and 1,400+ liters of bio-fertilizer.

Success Spotlight

The Sharamentsa Project combined traditional forest patrols with GPS mapping to reduce illegal logging, creating sustainable local jobs while protecting vital ecosystems.


For over a decade, Ikiama Nukuri ("Women as Guardians of the Forest") has worked alongside Achuar and Shuar midwives to improve maternal and infant health—blending ancestral knowledge with modern healthcare.

2024 Achievements

- Healthcare Training: Trained 25 more Indigenous women as community health promoters.
- **Economic Empowerment:** Equipped 20 women with skills for financial independence.
- Safe Births: Distributed nearly 500 safe birth kits and advanced construction of Casa de la Mujer (Midwifery House)—the first in Achuar territory.
- Violence Prevention: Facilitated workshops on gender roles and domestic violence prevention.
- Health Access: Signed four new agreements with local health districts, expanding mobile medical teams to remote areas.

Our Impact Since 2013

- 2,838 safe births assisted
- 63 active community health promoters (51 Achuar, 12 Shuar)
- 102 communities with improved healthcare access
- 90% reduction in maternal and infant mortality rates



The Amazon Sacred Headwaters Alliance (ASHA) unites 30 Indigenous nations across Ecuador and Peru to permanently protect 86 million acres of the Amazon rainforest. In 2024, ASHA achieved groundbreaking milestones in conservation, Indigenous sovereignty, and global advocacy.

2024 Breakthroughs

- Global Recognition: Won the Schwab Foundation Social Innovation Award and named an Earthshot Prize Finalist.
- Worldwide Advocacy: Amplified Indigenous voices at Climate and Biodiversity COPs, advocating for Amazon protection on the world stage.
- Defending Sacred Lands: Blocked new oil projects, illegal mining, and a hydroelectric dam threatening the Piatúa River.
- Indigenous Protection: Secured legal recognition for five previously unacknowledged groups living in voluntary isolation (IPVI).
- Youth Leadership Training: Expanded La Escuela Viva de la Amazonia (Living Amazon School), training Indigenous youth in governance, human rights, and ancestral knowledge.
- **Bioregional Plan 2030:** Advanced a visionary roadmap for a just, ecological transition, blending Indigenous stewardship with sustainable development.


AMAZON SACRED HEADWATERS ALLIANCE (ASHA)

Bioregional Plan 2030

ASHA's Bioregional Plan 2030 is a blueprint for conservation and sustainable development, designed to protect 86 million acres of the Amazon. Through a new ecological-economic model, it drives systemic change, preserving the Amazon and enhancing community well-being.

Key Commitments

- Indigenous Rights: Legalize 22+ million acres of Indigenous lands.
- Ecosystem Restoration: Conserve 49.4 million acres of high-biodiversity forests and restore 21.4 million acres of degraded land.
- **Regenerative Economy:** Foster sustainable livelihoods to prevent deforestation and support Buen Vivir (Good Living).
- **Climate Action:** Maintain the Amazon as a global carbon sink and push for a post-carbon economy.
- Amazonian Well-being: Strengthen the Sacred Headwaters
 Fund to improve living conditions while preserving biodiversity.
- **Financial Sustainability:** Secure funding through the Sacred Headwaters Fund to transition to a standing-forest economy.
- Indigenous-Led Solutions: Implement programs based on traditional knowledge, providing sustainable alternatives to extractive industries and creating a model for scalable conservation.





INQUIRY AND INSIGHT

In 2024, we asked a profound question: In keeping true to the original instructions our Indigenous partners gave us that along with protecting the rainforest we needed to "change the dream of the modern world," Pachamama Alliance asked:

How can we accelerate an evolutionary leap from human supremacy to human responsibility and sacred reciprocity with all Life?

This inquiry shaped our year. In June, we convened 65 leaders from five continents—Indigenous elders, scientists, artists, executives, and philanthropists—for a gathering grounded in Indigenous wisdom and ceremony.

Together, we explored how mutual flourishing can catalyze systemic change and foster a shared vision for humanity's relationship with Earth.

In August, we launched Earth Listening Circles, a global initiative inviting people into deep connection with Earth and one another.

Over 650 participants from 16 countries participated—either virtually or in person—helping seed a growing network of communities committed to listening, learning and building a regenerative future for all Life.

What we learned

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
PROGRAM-DRIVEN TRANSFORMATION

In 2024, Pachamama Alliance inspired individuals and communities to navigate today's complex challenges with possibility and purpose. By integrating ancestral knowledge with contemporary understanding, our educational initiatives inspire participants to reimagine their relationship with Earth, catalyzing a global movement committed to justice, sustainability, and collective wellbeing. Together, we are cultivating pathways toward a harmonious existence between humanity and Earth, ensuring a thriving world for all.


